

## MAYOR'S MESSAGE

### *MOTHER NATURE WREAKED HAVOC TO MANY AREAS OF THE TOWNSHIP...*

The last few months in our area as well as many other areas across the country have seen the destruction that Mother Nature can impose. In many ways we were far more fortunate than most. Hurricane "Irene", later downgraded to a tropical storm, swept into our community and brought with it, power failures, an untold number of downed trees and numerous flooded homes and basements. Even after the initial storm hit, it continued to rain and rain and rain which only exacerbated the problems. Perhaps it was the amount of rainfall – reported to be 10" - that wreaked more havoc than other storms that at the time were considered much more dangerous. With 19 square miles to cover you can well imagine the amount of debris that needed to be picked up or brought to Department of Public Works (DPW). I fully understand our resident's frustration and appreciate their patience as we did our best to hasten the clean up. We have only so many trucks, so many workers and only so many hours in the day - the task was daunting! We extended our Recycling Center hours and as I write this, we are still cleaning up the vestiges of Irene.

Residents should know that throughout the year the Office of Emergency Management, the Police Department, other first responders and other personnel who could conceivably be involved in emergencies do conduct tabletop exercises on how to handle potential emergency problems, including evacuation details should that become necessary. We also do a review of our operations after an event has passed. And while all this planning is good in theory, some situations present

unforeseen issues that are beyond our anticipation. It is difficult to understand, however, why drivers ignore a barricade or in some cases actually move it in order to drive through an area that has been deemed to be exceedingly dangerous. Or why when emergency personnel determine that people should be evacuated, people refuse to go. Obviously one cannot be forced to evacuate, however, by not obeying a rational well thought out directive they put all rescue personnel at risk should they have to be rescued at a later time. All of these measures are in effect for one reason – the safety and well-being of our residents. We can only hope that this type storm was an aberration and not something we will see again anytime soon. As a precautionary measure, and in order to be as self-sufficient as possible, residents should consider always having bottled water on hand, a sump pump, and consider investing in a generator which may prove useful in any type of power failure.

So on September 11, 2011; ten years later, it was important to be reminded of all whose lives were taken so senselessly, so horrifically, so quickly. It's also important to reflect on the thousands of family members and friends who will forever remain affected by the loss of a husband, a wife, a parent, a sibling, a colleague, a friend. Remembering also the firefighters, police officers, emergency responders and just plain folks who risked their lives to help those trapped beneath the rubble. We especially remember our own Township residents who lost their lives on that fateful morning – Harry Glenn, Yesh Tembe, Liming (Michael) Gu, Rajesh Khandelwal, and Andrew Spencer, who was born and raised in Piscataway. Alan Gu, Liming's son was just 1 ½ years old at the time and is now 11-years old and a part of the Tuesday's Children's mentoring program, which seeks to support the children of September 11th victims into adulthood. It is fortunate that there are programs like this for the many children who lost a parent.

The National Memorial and Museum in New York City which covers 7.5 acres of the original 16-acre World Trade Center footprint is now open for visitors and will remind us and all those who visit the site that the invincible American spirit can never be broken.

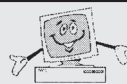

- Recycling/Trash Center Coupons and Recycling Center 2011 Trash Coupons **MUST BE PRESENTED AT THE GATE**, along with Driver's License as Proof of Residency. Rules & Regulations were mailed with Coupons.
- Residents entering the Center must have their vehicle properly insured, inspected and registered. The largest vehicle allowed in the Center is a half-ton pickup. Pickup trucks must surrender two (2) coupons.  
**NO COMMERCIAL TRUCKS OR TRUCKS WITH SIDEBOARDS ARE PERMITTED.**
- Coupons **ARE** required for lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture and all other acceptable non-recyclable materials. Coupons are **NOT** required for disposal of recyclable materials. This includes all recyclables picked up curbside, in addition to batteries, tires, motor oil, branches, and metal.
- **LEAF BAGS:** Biodegradable leaf bags will be available on or about October 3 at the DPW Garage – Monday – Friday – 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. **PROOF OF RESIDENCY IS REQUIRED.** These bags are to be used for LEAVES ONLY. Leaf pick up will begin the week of October 17, 2011 and will continue to December 30, 2011.  
**PLEASE NOTE:** Residents must obtain Coupons at the Tax Office in the Municipal Building to obtain leaf bags. Residents will be given two (2) free Coupons. Each Coupon is for one (1) bundle of twenty (20) bags. Additional Coupons may be purchased for \$6.00 per bundle. **LEAF BAGS WILL NOT BE ISSUED WITHOUT COUPONS.**

The award was created in 1992 to honor the memory of Thomas Barton Post, a founding member and strong supporter of the Metlar-Bodine House Museum. The non-member award went to Francis Schott, owner of Stage Left, and Mark Pascal, owner of Clydz, both restaurants in New Brunswick. This year a new award, The Student Service Award, was created to honor the memory of Mary Jane Post, a historic preservation advocate and Fellowship Trustee, and went to Matt Knobloch and Eric Swartz, Rutgers Public History Interns who interned at the museum during the summer and fall, respectively, in 2010.

*Police Officer Ullrich* was acknowledged for his steadfast commitment to the museum and for his challenging position as The Fellowship's treasurer. He also assisted with making the Fellowship's largest annual fundraiser – the Annual Benefit Dinner Auction – a noteworthy success.

Over the years, their generous donation of dinner certificates to the Annual Benefit Dinner Auction has helped the Fellowship toward achieving its ultimate goal: restoring the museum and reopening to the public.
