Stop the Spread of Coronavirus (COVID-19) and Other Respiratory Illnesses in Your Community

Middlesex County has made a commitment, since the beginning days of the COVID-19 pandemic, to provide residents with free access to testing and to conduct vital contact tracing. This work continues. As numbers in the state are promising, it is critical that we as a community continue to remain vigilant, protect ourselves and others, and continue to mitigate the spread of the disease.

It is important to remember that coronavirus (COVID-19) is an illness caused by a virus that can spread from person to person. The best way to protect yourself against viruses like COVID-19 or the flu is to avoid being exposed.

- You can help stop the spread of COVID-19 and other respiratory illnesses in your community by practicing healthy habits: washing your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds; not touching your eyes, nose and mouth; covering your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throwing the tissue in the trash and washing your hands; cleaning and disinfecting objects and surfaces that are touched often, and; staying home if you are sick.
- The symptoms of COVID-19 include cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fever, chills, muscle or body aches, vomiting or diarrhea, and new loss of taste or smell. Symptoms can range from mild to severe illness and appear 2–14 days after you are exposed to the virus. Get medical care immediately if someone has emergency warning signs of COVID-19: trouble breathing; persistent pain or pressure in the chest; new confusion; inability to wake or stay awake, or; bluish lips or face.
- If you go out, wear a cloth face covering over your nose and mouth and stay at least six feet (about two-arm's length) from other people. You can stop the spread of coronavirus in your community by wearing a face covering, getting tested, and talking to a contact tracer. Even if you do not have symptoms, you can save lives by getting a test.

Since April, the Middlesex County Office of Health Services has been operating both drive-thru and walk-up COVID-19 testing sites, free of charge to Middlesex County residents. As the schedule changes weekly, please visit the County's Public Safety & Health webpage for the latest details. To schedule an appointment, visit

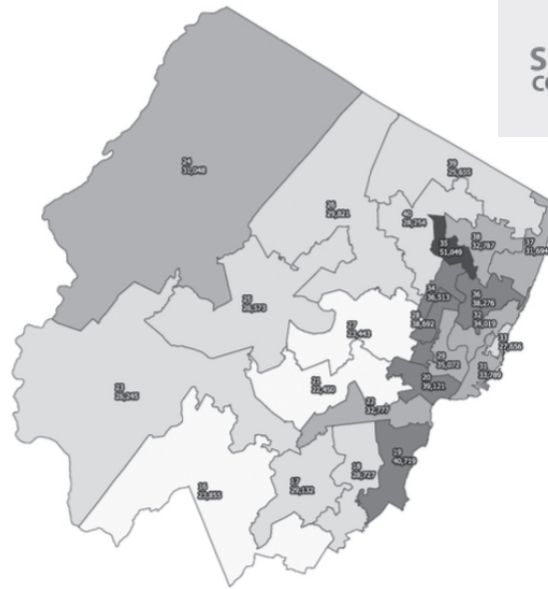
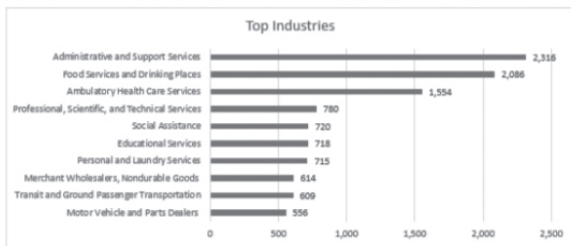

N.J. Initial Claims Processed by Legislative District 17

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic many people are facing some economic uncertainty and are stressed about the loss of a job, paying bills and putting food on the table. Across all of state government and in conjunction with our federal, county and local counterparts, we are all working to help.

From March 15th through July 25th, the Department of Labor received a total of 1,076,202 unemployment claims from the residents of New Jersey. During that same time frame, 29,132 of my constituents in the 17th Legislative District filed at least one claim for unemployment. Of those, 18,101 are for regular unemployment claims. 11,031 are for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance. These are staggering numbers when you consider that the 17th District is made up of five towns: Piscataway, Milltown, New Brunswick, North Brunswick and Franklin.

The Department of Labor's staff has been working tirelessly day and night since the pandemic began to help deliver \$263,753,255 (through July 18th) to 26,039

of the constituents in the 17th District whom have been struggling. Should you require assistance, please visit the New Jersey Department of Labor website NJ.gov/Labor to find the latest and most reliable information including what programs are available for employers and employees and who qualifies for these programs.

Unfortunately, even though the overwhelming majority of unemployment claimants in the 17th District have received an average of \$10,129 in benefits, there are still a small percentage of claimants who have not yet become eligible or have some other issue. My office, along with the offices of both Assemblymember Joe Egan and Assemblymember Joe Danielsen, has been working with the Department of Labor's liaison staff to forward information from constituents whom have contacted my office. Problems do not always get resolved quickly, but our staff is dedicated to attempting every way possible to assist each constituent.

For those seeking new employment opportunities, the State of New Jersey has a

Ultraviolet or "UV" pool sanitizers is non-chemical process that uses germicidal UV light rays to sanitize water, air and surfaces that may be contaminated. Ultraviolet pool sanitizers emit a high intensity germicidal light ray that alters or disrupts the DNA or RNA of targeted organisms such as algae, bacteria, viruses, cysts and protozoa. The highly concentrated electromagnetic energy also destroys organic matter, eliminating the formation of dangerous chlorine by-products.

So is this process safe for our swimmers and the environment? UV sanitizers are very safe. The UV lamps are housed in a rugged high-impact polymer housing. UV cannot leave or escape the sterilization chamber so UV never enters the swimming pool.

UV is a physical process rather than a chemical process, making UV the most environmentally friendly choice in pool sanitation. There is no residual effect that is harmful to humans or the environment. UV also minimizes the need to generate, handle, transport or store dangerous chemicals.

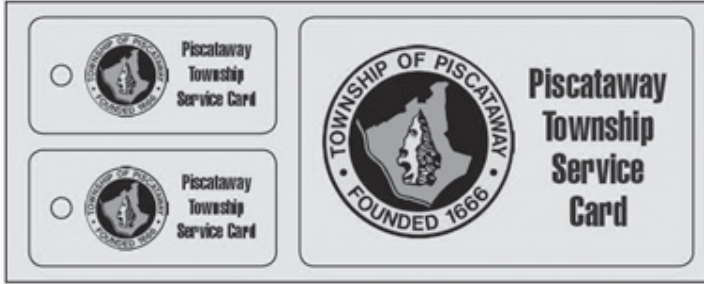
All of our pool water is constantly being treated and disinfected through the use of the commonly recognized chemical chlorine in the YPCC pools, and 100 percent of the pool water is filtered and run through the UV disinfection process including every three hours in the children's activity pool and every six hours for the competitive and standard activity pools. New Jersey bather code requires a turnover rate of eight hours.

We are excited and eager to open our facilities in the very near future. In the meantime, continue to practice social distancing and stay healthy during these times!

Please remember that paper coupons are no longer mailed to residents for using services at the Piscataway DPW. The Piscataway Service Card has now replaced coupons for accessing all those services. It is similar to a credit card that features a bar code directly linked to your postal address and tax record. All service credits are electronically entered. As services are used, they will be debited from the card with scanners operated by DPW personnel when you come to our facility in person or through office computers when scheduling curbside pickups by phone.

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, until further notice our offices are closed to the public, so while you cannot acquire a Piscataway Service Card in person, one can be mailed to you. Please visit the Township website at www.PiscatawayNJ.org, click on “Services” on the front page, then click on “Service Card” from the drop down menu and follow the instructions. You may call DPW at (732) 562-2390 if you need further assistance.

Credit for additional leaf bags may be purchased at the DPW office and entered onto your Service Card. Debit cards, credit cards and checks are the only forms of payment accepted.

Residents entering the Recycling Center must have their vehicle properly insured, inspected and registered and you will need to bring your Piscataway Service Card to be used as your ID.

Curbside/bulk pick-up: October 9th is the final day for scheduled curbside/bulk pick up for appointments made no later than September 18th. This program will then resume on January 11, 2021.

Leaf bags: Biodegradable leaf bags will be available October 5th - December 18th at the DPW Yard Door #11, Mondays-Fridays from 7 a.m. - 6 p.m. Credit for two free bundles of 20 leaf bags each will be included in each Piscataway Service Card and the bags can be acquired by presenting your Service Card. Additional leaf bags may be purchased for \$8 per bundle at the DPW office and credit will be recorded on your Service Card. Leaf bag curbside pick-up will commence on October 15th and will continue until December 28th. Leaf bags are for leaves only.

Christmas trees: Christmas trees will not be picked up curbside. You may bring them devoid of decorations to your nearest firehouse or to the Recycling Center during regular hours until January 31, 2021.

Sterling Village



Apartments are available for those age 62 and older with low and moderate incomes at Sterling Village, Piscataway’s independent senior living residence.

Located adjacent to the Senior Center, John F. Kennedy Library and Community Center, the 150-unit, five-story building has elevators, a community room, laundry on the first floor, and a furnished outdoor patio & grill. A security guard is on duty in the evenings and on weekends. Owned by the Township, it is professionally managed by Lutheran Social Ministries of New Jersey.

You do not need to be a Piscataway resident to move into Sterling Village. At this time, there are vacancies for low-income \$984/month and moderate-income \$1,181/month one-bedroom apartments with electricity and gas included. Work Goes on Behind the Scenes

Although the Metlar-Bodine Museum has been closed due to the coronavirus pandemic, work has been continuing behind the scenes. This summer, two interns joined the volunteer staff (now numbering five): Sophia, (back for the 2nd time) is a high school sophomore and Piscataway resident; Ian is a Kean University junior majoring in history. Sophia is helping to develop children's programs & workshops and Ian is assisting the museum's volunteer archivist with accessioning the collection.

The Metlar-Bodine House is a collecting museum. Its extensive collection contains over 1,500 artifacts with area provenance that includes towns once part of the original 300 square mile land grant. Currently the collection is stored in two rooms in the museum's circa 1840s section – rooms always intended for other uses. A recently awarded grant from Middlesex County, matched by the Township, will allow crucial changes to be realized. One room will become a dedicated research-archives room open by appointment to the public/scholars/museum members; an unfinished loft (circa 1728) will become a sorely-needed, dedicated archive storage and workroom for accessioning artifacts used only by staff. When the loft archive is completed, artifacts will be relocated to this area, freeing up the room intended for changing/special exhibits, while selected artifacts will remain in the research-archives room. The remainder will be exhibited, illustrating the museum's theme.

Listed on the National and State Registers of Historic Places, the museum is a community and educational resource. As a significant feature of community outreach, the information and documentation contained within must be made accessible.
