hat a wonderful summer we had! Whether it was our Jackie Robinson Day, Street Fair, Walk for Your Health, July 4th fireworks, Bike Rodeo, Concert in the Park season or National Night Out, our Township families had much to enjoy.

Now we are in the fall and progress with Piscataway Ecological Park continues to move forward! Our contracted engineers have been working diligently at the S. Washington Avenue & Metlars Lane site.

Of course, the current surveying and remediation take time. We have to work with the NJ Dept. of Environmental Protection by testing the soil and making sure all of the land will be safe for a park. Various areas of the planned park may have been affected by years of farm use. In other cases, impurities may be naturally

occurring. But by carefully adhering to state guidelines designed to protect us all, we will have an open-space park that will last for generations.

When will we have "shovels in the ground" to transform the landscape? Right now it looks like six months to a year. While factors like weather, available crews and materials could delay our plans, please know that Piscataway Township is committed to creating this vast open-space park.

As we craft the design of the park, we are mindful of views that many of you have expressed over the years. We want to maximize how this park may be used all while remaining loyal to its mission of providing natural serenity.

While the land is currently flat, we envision rolling hills and berms that will add variety to its landscape. Pavers for walkways among many trees, benches and gardens will be ideal for running, strolling or just relaxing among the greenery. We also think that the natural terrain may enable a family friendly venue for outdoor performances. We will also have a retention pond, ample parking and easily accessible pedestrian entrances.

As our community becomes even greener, I am thrilled that our country will as well by reducing carbon emissions by approximately 40 percent by 2030. The Inflation Reduction Act signed by President Biden is not just a comprehensive plan for national rejuvenation. This bill is an endowment for the livability of our world with \$369 billion over ten years to counter climate change and champion environmental justice.

Many households can take

advantage of new tax credits with up to \$7,500 to buy an electric vehicle – which can be powered for free at The YMCA at the Piscataway Community Center – and up to \$14,000 to make homes more energy efficient.

The manufacture of American clean energy technologies gets a \$60 billion boost and our ports get a \$3 billion clean up with new zero emissions technology. \$1 billion is provided for clean heavy-duty vehicles like school buses and garbage trucks.



Do you know where your local taxes go? Compared to 2017-2021, it's largely unchanged. As shown in this pie chart, you can see how in 2022 after being collected by the Township, nearly three-quarters of the funds are then sent to the County, four fire districts (each with their own tax rate), library system and School District. It's important to know that the Township Council takes some of its revenue and provides additional funding to the library system for its programming and personnel on top of what is automatically dedicated to its needs.



Creating Climate Resilience Along the Jersey Shore

New Jersey coasts have faced the brunt of climate change in recent years through increased flooding, rising sea levels and frequent extreme temperatures. We continue to fight against climate change and its effects on the economy and residents by building resilient responses at the state and local levels. While we work to implement measures to lessen the impacts of future climate change, we are also continuing to work towards mitigating effects we are already facing.

At a recent joint meeting of the Senate and Assembly Environment Committee, guests included Commissioner Shawn LaTourette of the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and the Director of Conservation Programs and the Coastal Projects Coordinator at the Nature Conservancy Eric Adams. Coastal climate change was discussed with an emphasis on needing to continue our fight against it and continuing to build resilient infrastructure and communities.

There are two different potential efforts that can occur when responding to climate change: natural solutions and engineered solutions. A natural solution, like restoring salt marshes to sustain healthy coastal habitats, was discussed. Plants found in salt

marshes are proven to reduce wave activity and hold sediment in place further reducing the effects of climate change on our coasts and to our residents. On the other hand, an engineered solution would be continuing to create flood resilient infrastructure.

Two of my sponsored bills were up for discussion: S-416 and S-2978. S-416 would divest New Jersey pension funds from fossil fuel companies. This bill aligns with our state's response to climate change and our renewable energy goals as well as prevents any potential financial risk associated with the future of fossil fuel companies. S-2978 strengthens New Jersey's renewable energy portfolio and would require utilities to sell a specified percentage of electricity from renewable energy sources each year. Overall, the bill would continue to move the state away from its use of fossil fuels. This would help accelerate the timeline of the Murphy Administration's climate goal of reaching 100 percent clean energy by 2050.

With the upcoming ten-year anniversary of Superstorm Sandy and one year anniversary of Tropical Storm Ida, the devastating effects of extreme weather influenced by climate change in New Jersey along the shore is in the forefront of our minds. The effects are still being felt today: the destruction of homes, economic instability and loss of life. Extreme storm frequency will only continue to increase and we must prepare and respond to this increasing threat. The long-term benefits of these proposed solutions and continuous efforts will be evident in generations to come.

Recycling Center hours to December 31, 2022

Tuesdays & Thursdays, 2-8 p.m. (Gates close at 7:45 p.m.) Saturdays, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. (Gates close at 4:15 p.m.) Sundays, Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays & holidays – Closed

Additional closings: Tuesday, November 8; Thursday, November 24; Saturday, December 24, and; Saturday, December 31.

Residents entering the Recycling Center must have their vehicle properly insured, inspected and registered. You will also need to bring your Piscataway Service Card to be used as your ID.

Your Service Card is used for accessing all the services at the Piscataway DPW. It is similar to a credit card that features a bar code directly linked to your postal address and tax record. All service credits are electronically entered. As services are used, they will be debited from the card with scanners operated by DPW personnel when you come to our facility in person or through office computers when scheduling curbside pickups by phone.

Homeowners and landlords should please e-mail their phone number and an image of their driver's license to ServiceCards@PiscatawayNJ.org and a Service Card will be mailed to you. You may call DPW at (732) 562-2390 if you need further assistance.

Bagged grass: October 1st is the final day that residents may bring bagged grass to the Recycling Center. Each disposal of grass clippings using your own 30 gallon bag can be purchased for credit into your Piscataway Service Card. Each 30 gallon grass disposal shall be at a cost of \$1.00 per bag. A minimum of two credits that are entered into the Piscataway Service Card must be purchased and valid only within the year of purchase.

Additional leaf bags and grass disposal credits may be purchased at the DPW office and entered onto your Service Card that will be debited when picking up the purchased leaf bags or grass disposal credits. Debit cards, credit cards and checks are the only forms of payment accepted.

Curbside/bulk pick-up: October 7th is the final day for scheduled curbside/bulk pick up for appointments made no later than September 16th. This program will then resume on January 9th, 2023.

Leaf bags: Biodegradable leaf bags will be available October 11th – December 16th at the DPW Yard Door #11, Mondays-Fridays from 7 a.m. - 6 p.m. Credit for two free bundles of 20 leaf bags each will be included in each Service Card and the bags can be acquired by presenting your Service Card. Additional leaf bags may be purchased for \$10 per bundle at the DPW office and credit will be recorded on your Service Card. Leaf bag curbside pick-up will commence on October 16th and will continue until December 30th. Leaf bags are for leaves only.

Christmas trees: Christmas trees will not be picked up curbside. You may bring them devoid of decorations to your nearest firehouse or to the Recycling Center during regular hours until January 31st, 2023.

Sign up online for any Building/Construction inspection



Did you have your water heater replaced? Are you having electrical work done in your home? New plumbing work? New addition or a deck? For these and other improvements, you will need a Township inspection.

Piscataway Township is set up with "SDL Portal" to enable you to register an account and schedule your appointment.



Our Township Building Division will send one of its staff to your house.

Please note that these types of inspections are not for a Certificate of Continued Occupancy (CCO) when you are selling your home. For that, please contact the Township's MCCO office at (732) 562-2393 or CCO@PiscatawayNJ.org.

Be mindful of what you flush

The Piscataway sewer system is designed to flow from your home through the Township owned sewer lines to the treatment plant in Sayreville. In some areas, due to the topography, flow has to go uphill and must be assisted by lift stations known as pump stations. At this point, certain elements have to be excluded as the pumps can get jammed by materials such as fabrics, both woven and non-woven. Other types of products include baby wipes, chemically treated wipes, sanitary napkins and most paper towels. Although many manufacturers of these products list them as flushable, in reality, they are not.

We ask that you dispose of these non-flushable materials via your regular garbage collection for deposit at a landfill. By complying, you will reduce the possibility of you having a plumbing company rectify a sewer blockage at an estimated cost of \$125 per hour.
