Did you know that we are one of the most diverse Townships in the state? According to the U.S. Census Bureau's most recent information from the 2020 Census, Piscataway's population of nearly 61,000 is 37.1 percent Asian including those of Asian Indian, Chinese and Filipino heritage, 20.0 percent African American, 14.1 percent Hispanic and 26.7 percent white non-Hispanic.

That we cherish and celebrate our diversity is what makes Piscataway special. Leading our efforts is our Piscataway Civil Rights Advisory Commission with great work throughout the year including our Martin Luther King, Jr. Day commemoration.

You can see the youth of our community come together on the newly built playgrounds and other amenities at our 26 outstanding parks – and that number is slated to rise to 27 with our open space park! The Township Council and I are thrilled to move beyond more than two decades of litigation limbo and finally create Piscataway Ecological Park. This will be dozens of acres of natural surroundings dedicated solely for the open space enjoyment of our residents.

Throughout the year you can see young kids, teenagers and

adults come together in our many Township Recreation programs. Did you know that our youth programs are free? You'll see in this newsletter the fun in basketball, softball and other sports all at no cost to you. In fact if we can get enough interest, we may start youth cricket as well as pickleball lessons for adults.

For our older residents, we are very proud of our AARP-recognized Senior Center and its programs that too are all free. Whether exercise and art classes or learning computer skills, our seniors are enjoying great programs. We are hopeful to soon get back to having holiday parties and cultural celebrations such as Lunar New Year and simply seeing our seniors enjoy a cup of coffee and a good

conversation together.


The crown jewel of our Township is of course our new \$32 million community center built with no residents' tax monies. Even with membership rates that are very affordable – for example, \$65/ month for a family of up to two adults and four kids – we have scholarship programs to defray those costs for needy families.

Have you seen its tall flagpoles? We're pleased to use them to recognize our Township's diversity such as flying the Pride flag in June and having an India Independence Day flag raising ceremony in August.

Do you know where your local taxes go? Compared to 2017-2020, it's largely unchanged. As shown in this pie chart, you can see how in 2021 after being collected by the Township, nearly three-quarters of the funds are then sent to the County, four fire districts (each with their own tax rate), library system and School Board. It's important to know that the Township Council takes some of its revenue and provides additional funding to the library system for its programming and personnel on top of what is automatically dedicated to its needs.

Ambulance Services

Our Township is fortunate to have an affordable 24/7 contract with Hackensack Meridian Health JFK (HMH JFK) for its top-notch ambulance services. With it, you will never be charged for Basic Life Support (BLS) including co-pays. Our contract does not cover Advanced Life Support (ALS) and depending on where you live in



town, you could be serviced by either HMH JFK or RWJ Barnabas. If your emergency meets the severity of ALS criteria, you will get a bill but your medical insurance should cover some of the ALS costs. This arrangement is the same as previously provided when the local Piscataway volunteer rescue squads responded to BLS calls and ALS was provided by others and residents were billed.

For BLS calls, our contract has arrangements for those without insurance, but for those with medical coverage, it benefits all residents to have your insurance billed for BLS. When you are contacted by HMH JFK, please provide your insurance information.

You may remember that up until last fall, we had different day and night ambulance coverage by RWJ Barnabas and volunteer rescue squads. Our neighborhoods and needs continued to grow and unfortunately, many times the rescue squads had to call out of service for their shifts because they did not have enough people to field a crew. That is why we put out a competitive bid for a five year, 24-hour, 7 days-a-week, 365 days-a-year contract to maintain consistent coverage for the entire Township. We received three responses: HMH JFK for just over \$1 million, RWJ Barnabas for more than \$3.5 million and the River Road Rescue Squad for over \$4.2 million.

With excellent reliability, we now have Township-wide, round-the-clock ambulance service from HMH JFK. If you should ever encounter a billing problem for BLS service, please be sure to call the Mayor's office at (732) 562-2301.



Sign up online for a water heater inspection

If you recently had your water heater replaced, your contractor secured a building permit to do so. The next step is having it inspected by the Township which is your responsibility to schedule.

Piscataway Township is set up with "SDL Portal" to enable you to register an account and schedule your appointment.



Our Township Building Division can either send one of its staff to your house or can provide a virtual inspection with your smart phone. Please let us know your preference when you schedule.

Right now, only inspections for water heaters can be scheduled online.

College scholarship

The Piscataway Domestic Violence Crisis Intervention Team (PDVCIT) is awarding a \$1,000 college scholarship to graduating seniors who live in Piscataway and attend a public or private high school.

The purpose of this scholarship is to recognize a graduating senior who has overcome unusual and extenuating circumstances, who "against all odds" is determined to reach her or his goals in spite of these obstacles, has remained in school, maintained passing grades and has been accepted into an institution of higher education.

Students may be self-nominated or recommended by school faculty or staff. The completed application must include a high school transcript and an essay of 500 words maximum on why she or he should be chosen. The application must demonstrate academic achievement through evidence of working toward potential and the student must be accepted for the 2022 fall semester at a university, county college or technical institute of higher education.

The Pathway to Progress in New Jersey in the Climate Change Crisis

Climate change creates increased inland flood risks, sea-level rise and storm surges which lead to storm damage and substantial economic loss. At the first Senate Environment and Energy Committee meeting of the new legislative session, invited guests included the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities (BPU) President and the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) Commissioner. They spoke of efforts the BPU and NJDEP have taken to mitigate the potentially devastating effects of climate change.

As a state with 130 miles of shoreline, New Jersey has a sea level rise risk two times greater than most other states, and some projections suggest a rise in sea level of two feet by 2050 and five feet by 2100. Studies conducted by the NJDEP found that precipitation has increased 2.5%-10% over the last twenty years and will continue to increase 20%-50% in the next eighty years. The NJDEP is working to ensure the integration of climate risk across insurance markets, businesses, and governments while also evaluating community preparedness for these devastating impacts.

The speed with which we act as a nation and a state will determine the severity of the effects of climate change for generations to come. Our state's largest source of greenhouse gas emissions comes from transportation. Recently passed legislation will incentivize electric vehicles and charging stations in New Jersey. We need to change our fuel sources for electric power generation. Fossil fuel electricity is killing our planet. My suggestion is the replacement of fossil fuel generating stations with renewable electricity sources as

the fossil fuel plants retire so as not to create rate shock on our utility ratepayers.

As a state and community, we must all work together in this fight to protect our state and planet. Climate change will continue to increase with storm severity and frequency increasing every year. The Murphy Administration plans to reach 100% clean energy by 2050.

The economic cost of not doing anything to stop climate change is far more than that of converting to clean energy sources now. Since 2011 there have been eight major storms in our state costing billions of dollars and the loss of human life. The BPU focuses on the affordability of clean energy and fights to reduce costs for all New Jerseyans as highlighted in its mission statement. Currently, the BPU has contracts for about one half of the construction of 7,500 megawatts of offshore wind electricity by 2035.

New Jersey is currently the number one state for solar panel installations per square mile with 150,000 installations which has helped create over 6,000 jobs. However, we must also continue development of the state's electric grid as its modernization will ensure it can store and deliver power to consumers. New bill S-431 will accelerate grid scale solar interconnections to the grid and S-1173 will incentivize battery storage of renewable energy.

Also during closed times, congregate meals through the Middlesex County Nutrition Program are delivered to Township seniors by Piscataway Senior Center staff. If you are in need of home delivered meals, are at least 60 years old and are not able to grocery shop or cook for yourself, please call (732) 793-9844. Examples of meals are stuffed chicken with broccoli, chicken parmesan sub sandwiches, cheeseburgers, crab cakes, and turkey & gravy. Non-meat meals such as veggie burgers, tofu & vegetable stir-fry, and cheese omelets with salsa are also available.

Recycling Center & Mini Dump hours through December 31, 2022

Since January 2020, residents have been using the new Piscataway Service Card featuring a unique UPC code for DPW services. Based on our observations and feedback it seems to be quite successful due to its convenience. Until further notice due to the Covid-19 pandemic our municipal offices remain closed to the public. So for information on acquiring the Service Card please call the DPW office at (732) 562-2390 located at 505 Sidney Road during business hours of Mondays-Fridays from 8:30 a.m-12:20 p.m. and 1:30-4:30 p.m. Only checks and credit/debit cards may be used to add funds for grass credits or additional leaf bags to your service card. No cash is accepted.

Credits are required for grass disposal and may be purchased in the Public Works Office starting Tuesday, March 1st, 8:30 a.m.-12:20 p.m. & 1:30-4:30 p.m., and are good for the current year only. Cost: \$1 per credit (minimum purchase) for two credits. The grass credits do not include a bag. The bag up to 30 gallons is to be supplied by the resident. The Recycling Center will accept bagged grass with credits starting Tuesday, April 5th. Credits will be placed on the service card account when purchased.

Credits are also required for lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture and all other non-recyclable materials that are acceptable as trash for disposal at the recycling yard. Not permitted are kitchen garbage, hazardous or toxic waste, chemicals, paints, contractor debris, dirt, concrete or any other type of rock debris.

Every year credits will be placed into the account for four trash visits and two curbside pickups. A passenger vehicle requires one credit and a pickup truck requires two credits. Residents must provide a service card for recyclable materials such as batteries, tires (maximum two per trip), motor oil, branches, leaves, metal, various plastics and glass, cardboard and paper. A list of recyclable materials are available on the Piscataway website at www.PiscatawayNJ.org. Brush may be brought to the Mini Dump but it cannot be greater than four (4) inches in diameter. Recycling and brush trips are unlimited but residents must have their service card for each visit.

Electronic devices covered by the NJ Electronic Waste Management Act include televisions, desktop & personal computers, monitors, printers and fax machines. They may be brought to the Recycling Center during hours of operation. Electronics will not be picked up curbside.

Hazardous materials

Residents are encouraged to recycle hazardous household materials and paint at Middlesex County's designated locations at announced dates & times. Piscataway Township does not accept any hazardous waste, toxic waste materials, chemicals or paints at its Recycling Center & Mini Dump. Please access the Middlesex County Improvement Authority website at http://www.MiddlesexCountyNJ.gov/Government/Departments/mcia/Pages/Recycling/Recycle.aspx for recycling information.

Bulk pick-ups

Residents may schedule two (2) bulk trash curbside pickups and one (1) brush curbside pickup per calendar year by calling (732) 562-2390 for an appointment. Brush no longer than five (5) feet in length or greater than four (4) inches in diameter must be bundled and tied. The brush must be stacked neatly at the curb in bundles no more than one (1) foot in diameter and the pile can be no longer than ten (10) feet in length, five (5) feet deep and four (4) feet high. Residents must have their service card before calling. The last appointments can be scheduled in mid-September and the final curbside pickups end in the second week of October. During the summer months there may be a six to eight week wait so schedule as early as you can. Branches must be bundled and tied. No bagged brush is allowed.

Arriving

All residents entering the Mini Dump must have their vehicles properly insured, inspected and registered. Open toed and flip flops are not allowed to be worn in the center. Children are not permitted to leave their vehicle and roam the recycling yard. No trucks larger than half-ton pickups and no trucks with sideboards are allowed. Pickup trucks and full size vans are required to provide two (2) credits per visit.

Parking is available in the visitor lot facing Sidney Road. Please enter through the building's main entrance.
