



Jeffrey R. Byrne memorial

Piscataway Township is pleased to have improved the Jeffrey R. Byrne memorial at Byrne Park in advance of Memorial Day.

Byrne grew up in Piscataway's Lake Nelson neighborhood. A 19-year-old U.S. Army helicopter pilot serving in the Vietnam War, he was shot down on February 18, 1968 in the Quang Nam province. He was buried at Beverly National Cemetery. Byrne Park on Woodland Road near Lake Nelson is named after our local hero.

With American Legion Post 261 dignitaries and Council President Gabrielle Cahill (At-Large) in attendance, Mayor Brian C. Wahler gave the following speech in late May at our Township's Memorial Day observance at Veterans Memorial Park:

“It is my great privilege and solemn honor to preside again over our community’s observance of Memorial Day.

“While we wish that circumstances were different to enable a large gathering, I am confident and proud of the patriotism for this country felt throughout this Township.

“As the world faces a health crisis and the populace of our nation is asked to mobilize its resources for the common good, let us remember the heroic example set by so many in uniform from those among us and generations before us.

“Some from our Township like Holmes Marshall and Jeffrey R. Byrne lost their lives in a foreign land in the defense of our country and its ideals. Their sacrifice, as well as that of so many more, should pause us all to consider how we can best give of ourselves to our community and country.

“Their profound legacy is a moral calling that we should act in the best interest of our fellow Americans and live our lives with deep reverence for the men and women whom have served in our armed forces.”

Recycling/Mini-Dump Center's summertime days & hours

Tuesdays – 2 p.m.-8 p.m. (Gates close at 7:45 p.m.)

Thursdays – 2 p.m.-8 p.m. (Gates close at 7:45 p.m.)

Saturdays – 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. (Gates close at 4:15 p.m.)

The Center is closed on Sundays, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays as well as certain holidays.

Residents must wear a mask or similar covering when coming to the Center.

Need to dispose of leaves? Grass? Other bagged brush or vegetation? Since January 1, 2020, in lieu of the coupons being mailed to residents, you will use the new Piscataway Service Card that electronically contains the services provided by DPW through a UPC code.

While a Service Card packet is normally provided at the DPW office, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, no residents may enter the DPW offices. However, homeowners may e-mail an image of their driver's license to ServiceCards@PiscatawayNJ.org and a card packet will be sent in the mail. Renters will need their landlords to obtain a service card packet for them. If you need assistance, please call our office at (732) 562-2390 on Mondays-Fridays from 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

Grass disposal is now free of charge until further notice due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Once pandemic restrictions are released, grass coupons can be purchased at the DPW office and added to the service card for one dollar (\$1.00) per 30-gallon bag (supplied by the residents) that is disposed. A minimum of two \$1.00 purchases must be made with each transaction. Only checks or credit/debit cards are accepted for any purchases made through the DPW office. Checks should be made out to "Township of Piscataway." The service card acts as your ID and must be presented at the gate as proof of residency.

Public Works will not pick up leaf bags until the Fall. Residents who leave leaf bags at the curb after receiving a notice to abate may be subject to a fine. However, residents may bring them to the Mini-Dump Center during its summertime hours. Unbagged vegetation such as branches brought to the Center will not be debited from your service card but will be scanned for record purposes.

Need to get rid of lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture or other such non-recyclable materials? This is also when to use your service card under the continuing rules & regulations. When you bring any of these materials to the Center, you must present your service card as your ID. A car-load of these materials needs one scan of the card; a pick-up truck needs two scans of the service card to debit each permitted deposit of trash.

Residents entering the Center must have their vehicles properly insured, inspected and registered. The largest vehicle allowed is a half-ton pick-up truck. No commercial vehicles, trucks with side boards, boxed U-Hauls or moving trucks are permitted.

What to do with materials such as batteries, tires, motor oil, certain metal items (washers, dryers, dishwashers, hot water heaters, refrigerators, air conditioners), certain electronics (televisions, desktop or personal computers, computer monitors, portable computers, desktop printers, desktop fax machines) as well as any recyclables usually picked up curbside? You can bring these to the Center. As these items are recyclable, none of the services provided will be debited but your service card will be scanned for record purposes.

Some items may not be brought to the Center. No paint, hazardous waste, kitchen garbage, contractor debris, dirt, rocks or stones are handled by the Township. The Center will also not accept other electronics such as cell phones, copiers, digital cameras, DVD players, e-book readers, keyboards, MP3 players, modems, mice, personal digital assistants (PDAs), scanners, stereo and radio equipment, telephones, VCRs or any products that contain rechargeable batteries not included in this list. Please contact the Middlesex County Division of Solid Waste Management at (732) 745-4170 for information on how to dispose of such items.

Need a special curbside pickup? Until mid-October, residents may schedule two curbside trash pickups and one curbside branch pick up. Your service card will be debited accordingly. To schedule, please call the Public Works Department at (732) 562-2390 no later than Friday, September 13th.

Please keep in mind that for branches picked up curbside, the bundles must be tied with string and be no wider than one foot in diameter. Crews will not take any branches longer than five feet in length and no wider than four inches in diameter. Any bundles containing construction-type wood, metal or other foreign objects will not be taken. Please stack the bundles neatly at the curb, making the pile no longer than ten feet in length, five feet deep and four feet high.

Kennedy Library and Community Center, the 150-unit, five-story building has elevators, a community room, laundry on the first floor, and a furnished outdoor patio & grill. A security guard is on duty in the evenings and on weekends. Owned by the Township, it is professionally managed by Lutheran Social Ministries of New Jersey.

You do not need to be a Piscataway resident to move into Sterling Village. At this time, there are vacancies for low-income \$984/month and moderate-income \$1,181/month one-bedroom apartments with electricity and gas included. Cats and dogs up to 20 lbs. are allowed with a one-time \$75 pet security deposit. For more information, please call (732) 699-0033.

Property reassessment

To ensure fair property tax bills for all residents, properties in the Township are revalued each year based on an analysis of the real estate market but some by inspection. A five year cycle calls for one region of the Township to be inspected in a particular year, last year being those homes in Fire District 4.

Township officials are in the midst of determining how best to move forward with inspections planned for homes in the Arbor and part of New Market with a primary focus on public health and is currently awaiting guidance from the New Jersey Division of Taxation's Property Administration Branch.

Property owners will be notified by letter from the Piscataway Tax Assessor's office about when and how inspections will occur in their area.
