Lastly, I would like to congratulate all of those in Piscataway High School's Class of 2022. The Township Council and I wish all of you the best of luck on your future endeavors.



Do you know where your local taxes go? Compared to 2017-2020, it's largely unchanged. As shown in this pie chart, you can see how in 2021 after being collected by the Township, nearly three-quarters of the funds are then sent to the County, four fire districts (each with their own tax rate), library system and School Board. It's important to know that the Township Council takes some of its revenue and provides additional funding to the library system for its programming and personnel on top of what is automatically dedicated to its needs.

Senior Center

The wonderful Piscataway Senior Center staff is available at (732) 562-1133 on Mondays-Fridays, 7 a.m.-3 p.m., to help our older residents register for bus transportation for grocery shopping and medical appointments.

In-person classes are held daily at the Senior Center. Registration by phone is required.

Congregate meals through the Middlesex County Nutrition Program are available to Township seniors at the Senior Center at 11:30 a.m. Monday through Friday. Home delivered meals are available to residents at least 60 years old and not able to grocery shop or cook. Examples of meals are stuffed chicken with broccoli, chicken parmesan sub sandwiches, cheeseburgers, crab cakes, and turkey & gravy. Non-meat meals such as veggie burgers, tofu & vegetable stirfry, and cheese omelets with salsa are also available. Trees

The warmer weather and longer days provide a greater opportunity for us to enjoy the outdoors. With the pressures of daily life abounding for

almost everyone, this is a good time to take a moment and enjoy some time outside. A change of scenery and an appreciation for nature can be as close as your backyard, one of our many parks here in town or one of our state parks or forests. With over 452,000 acres of state managed parks, forests, historic sites and recreational areas, you do not have to travel far for incredible outdoor opportunities. This past April 29th marked the 150th anniversary of Arbor Day. For history enthusiasts, the first Arbor Day was the legacy of J. Sterling Morton who was President Cleveland's Secretary of Agriculture during his second administration. He was a newspaper editor, politician and pioneer new to the prairie lands where there were hardly any trees. A practical farmer, Morton knew that trees made a difference as they shielded crops from the winds, held soil in place with their roots, provided shade and cleaned the air. Arbor Day today is celebrated nationwide and across the world. Planting seasons may differ, yet the benefits of planting trees remain steadfast for all of mankind.

Arbor Day has inspired my work in the New Jersey Legislature and has molded my choices for legislation over the years. Forests are critical to the environmental welfare of our State. They can play a major role in mitigating climate change by sequestering carbon dioxide, providing habitats for wildlife, helping clean and protect drinking water sources, and stabilizing soils. Proper management of forests is also necessary for preventing wildfires which are becoming more frequent and intense.

At the first Senate Environment and Energy Committee hearing of this new legislative session, as Chair, I announced the formation of the Forest Stewardship Task Force. The purpose of the Task Force will be to study and identify ways in which the State can best manage its forests to fight climate change, prevent forest fires, improve ecosystems and protect soil and water quality among other things. The Task Force will take feedback from interested parties and then compile a report on consensus and non-consensus issues with respect to forest stewardship for submission to the Senate Environment and Energy Committee.

For decades, we have been debating what proper management of the State's forests should look like and what the State's policies for forest stewardship should be for public lands. We have assembled this Task Force to identify and debate the major issues and ultimately develop consensus solutions which could form the basis for future legislation.

This summer when it gets too hot, seek the shade of a tree, and when you do, look up and whisper a quick thank you. That tree is helping remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere to mitigate global climate change and keep Piscataway from turning into beachfront property due to global warming.



Recycling/Mini-Dump Center's summertime days & hours

Tuesdays – 2 p.m.-8 p.m. (Gates close at 7:45 p.m.)

Thursdays – 2 p.m.-8 p.m. (Gates close at 7:45 p.m.)

Saturdays – 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. (Gates close at 4:15 p.m.)

The Center is closed on Sundays, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays as well as certain holidays.

When you arrive, your Piscataway Service Card acts as your ID and must be presented at the gate as proof of residency.

Residents entering the Center must have their vehicles properly insured, inspected and registered. The largest vehicle allowed is a half-ton pick-up truck. No contractors, commercial vehicles, trucks with side boards, boxed U-Hauls or moving trucks are permitted.

Need to dispose of leaves? Grass? Other bagged brush or vegetation? Use your service card to electronically enter the number of bags that you wish to purchase. Grass may be disposed at the recycling yard for a charge of \$1 per 30 gallon bag with bags provided by the resident. A minimum of two \$1 purchases must be made each transaction. Only checks or credit/debit cards are accepted for any purchases made through the DPW office. Checks should be made out to "Township of Piscataway." Please note that grass coupon credits are valid only in the year that they are purchased.

Public Works will not pick up leaf bags until the Fall. Residents who leave leaf bags at the curb after receiving a notice to abate may be subject to a fine. However, residents may bring them to the Center during its summertime hours. Unbagged vegetation such as branches brought to the Center will not be debited from your service card but will be scanned for record purposes.


Need to get rid of lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture or other such non-recyclable materials? A car-load of these materials needs one scan of your service card; a pick-up truck needs two scans of the service card to debit each permitted deposit of trash.

What to do with materials such as batteries, tires, motor oil, certain metal items (washers, dryers, dishwashers, hot water heaters, refrigerators, air conditioners), certain electronics (televisions, desktop or personal computers, computer monitors, portable computers, desktop printers, desktop fax machines) as well as any recyclables usually picked up curbside? You can bring these to the Center. As these items are recyclable, none of the services provided will be debited but your service card will be scanned for record purposes.

Some items may not be brought to the Center. No paint, used clothes, hazardous waste, kitchen garbage, contractor debris, dirt, rocks or stones are handled by the Township. The Center will also not accept other electronics such as cell phones, copiers, digital cameras, DVD players, e-book readers, keyboards, MP3 players, modems, mouses, personal digital assistants (PDAs), scanners, stereo and radio equipment, telephones, VCRs or any products that contain rechargeable batteries not included in this list. Please contact the Middlesex County Division of Solid Waste Management at (732) 745-4170 for information on how to dispose of such items.

Need a special curbside pickup? Until mid-October, residents may schedule two curbside trash pickups and one curbside branch pick up. Your service card will be debited accordingly. To schedule, please call the Public Works Department at (732) 562-2390 no later than Friday, September 9th as scheduling curbside pickups is done at least a month in advance.

Please keep in mind that for branches picked up curbside, the bundles must be tied with string and be no wider than one foot in diameter. Crews will not take any branches longer than five feet in length and no wider that four inches in diameter. Any bundles containing construction-type wood, metal or other foreign objects will not be taken. Please stack the bundles neatly at the curb, making the pile no longer than ten feet in length, five feet deep and four feet high.

East Jersey Old Town Village


