

## Mayor's Message

he wisest investment strategy over the past several years has been owning a home in Piscataway. Between 2017 and 2023, the average assessed home value increased by 38.36 percent.

As much as we all celebrate the success of a prosperous community, we also have to make sure that living in Piscataway remains affordable. That is why for the seventh year in a row we passed an annual budget that lowers the municipal tax rate.

Remember, residential property taxes are determined by the value of your home multiplied by the tax rates set by the municipal government, school district, Middlesex County, fire districts and Library. While the Township collects property taxes on behalf of every entity, usually only just over a quarter of your total property taxes go to the municipal government.

Nevertheless, the Township is doing its part by again lowering the municipal tax rate to offset much of the significant increase in the value of residential homes. We are keeping our financial house in order while providing top quality municipal services to all residents.

In 2018, we lowered the municipal tax rate by 12.8 percent from the 2017 rate. In 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022, it was lowered slightly each year. It was lowered by 8.11 percent last year and now it has been lowered another 7.39 percent for 2024.

Piscataway also maintains stellar bond ratings, specifically, AA+ stable from Standard & Poor's and its equivalent, Aa1(stable) from Moody's which are both their second highest ratings possible. According to Moody's, "The stable outlook reflects the township's strong and stable reserve position and growing local economy."

Keeping our budget sound from year to year is also due to our great economic development. Not only are families investing in Piscataway but so are new businesses. With logistics centers providing a notable portion of tax revenue, we are able to resurface and reconstruct many roads, provide free recreation programs for youth and put on many great events throughout the year.

Not only are these companies providing good paying jobs to hard working residents but their boost to Township finances enables us to now put solar panels on roofs and/or parking lot canopies at seven more municipal sites and build 28 additional charging stations for electric vehicles.





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Recycling/Mini-Dump Center's summertime days & hours

Closed holidays include Independence Day (Thursday, July 4th), Election Day (Tuesday, November 5th), Thanksgiving (Thursday, November 28th), Christmas Eve (Tuesday, December 24th) and New Year's Eve (Tuesday, December 31st)

When you arrive, your Piscataway Service Card acts as your ID and must be presented at the gate as proof of residency.

Residents entering the Center must have their vehicles properly insured, inspected and registered. The largest vehicle allowed is a half-ton pick-up truck. No contractors, commercial vehicles, trucks with side boards, boxed U-Hauls or moving trucks are permitted.

Need to dispose of leaves? Grass? Other bagged brush or vegetation? Use your service card to electronically enter the number of bags that you wish to purchase. Grass may be disposed at the recycling yard for a charge of \$1 per 30-gallon bag with bags provided by the resident. A minimum of two \$1 purchases must be made each transaction. Only checks or credit/debit cards are accepted for any purchases made through the DPW office. Checks should be made out to "Township of Piscataway." Please note that grass coupon credits are valid only in the year that they are purchased.

Public Works will not pick up leaf bags until the Fall. Residents who leave leaf bags at the curb after receiving a notice to abate may be subject to a fine. However, residents may bring them to the Center during its summertime hours. Unbagged vegetation such as branches brought to the Center will not be debited from your service card but will be scanned for record purposes.

Need to get rid of lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture or other such non-recyclable materials? A car-load of



these materials needs one scan of your service card; a pick-up truck needs two scans of the service card to debit each permitted deposit of trash.

What to do with materials such as batteries, tires, motor oil, certain metal items (washers, dryers, dishwashers, hot water heaters, refrigerators, air conditioners), certain electronics (televisions, desktop or personal computers, computer monitors, portable computers, desktop printers, desktop fax machines) as well as any recyclables usually picked up curbside? You can bring these to the Center. As these items are recyclable, none of the services provided will be debited but your service card will be scanned for record purposes.

Some items may not be brought to the Center. No paint, used clothes, hazardous waste, kitchen garbage, contractor debris, dirt, rocks or stones are handled by the Township. The Center will also not accept other electronics such as cell phones, copiers, digital cameras, DVD players, e-book readers, keyboards, MP3 players, modems, mouses, personal digital assistants (PDAs), scanners, stereo and radio equipment, telephones, VCRs or any products that contain rechargeable batteries not included in this list. Please contact the Middlesex County Division of Solid Waste Management at (732) 745-4170 for information on how to dispose of such items.

Need a special curbside pickup? Until mid-October, residents may schedule two curbside trash pickups and one curbside branch pick up. Your service card will be debited accordingly. To schedule, please call the Public Works Department at (732) 562-2390 no later than Friday, September 6<sup>th</sup> as scheduling curbside pickups is done at least a month in advance.

Please keep in mind that for branches picked up curbside, the bundles must be tied with string and be no wider than one foot in diameter. Crews will not take any branches longer than five feet in length and no wider that four inches in diameter. Any bundles containing construction-type wood, metal or other foreign objects will not be taken. Please stack the bundles neatly at the curb making the pile no longer than ten feet in length, five feet deep and four feet high.

#### Be mindful of what you flush

The Piscataway sewer system is designed to flow from your home through the Township-owned sewer lines to the treatment plant in Sayreville. In some areas, due to the topography, flow has to go uphill and must be assisted by lift stations known as pump stations. At this point, certain elements have to be excluded as the pumps can get jammed by materials such as fabrics, both woven and non-woven. Other types of products include baby wipes, chemically treated wipes, sanitary napkins and most paper towels. Although many manufacturers of these products list them as flushable, in reality, they are not. We ask that you dispose of these non-flushable materials via your regular garbage collection for deposit at a landfill. By complying, you will reduce the possibility of you having a plumbing company rectify a sewer blockage at an estimated cost of \$125 per hour.

### Single-Use Plastics Package Advances in Senate by Senator Bob Smith

This Earth Day, as Chair of the Senate Environment and Energy Committee, I held a joint hearing with the Chair of the Assembly Environment, Natural Resources and Solid Waste Committee on the issue of plastic pollution and its threats to human health. The testimony we heard highlights the increasing and varied dangers posed by the proliferation of plastics in our environment and, ultimately, in our bodies. Microplastics are now all around us, in the water we drink, the air we breathe and the food we eat. With constant exposure to these plastics and the chemicals involved in their production comes serious health risks including an increased risk of cancer and neurodevelopmental disorders as well as threats to reproductive health and fertility.

Though we have taken steps to reduce the prevalence of plastic in our environment, especially as it relates to single-use plastics such as shopping bags and food containers, the scale of this issue warrants further action. Together with my colleagues in the Senate and Assembly, I plan to develop legislation to further limit plastic use so that we can better protect both the public and the environment from the negative impacts posed by plastics.



Recently, the Senate Environment and Energy Committee advanced a three-bill package, which I am sponsoring, aimed at reducing plastic waste, combatting the proliferation of plastic in the environment and protecting human health from the dangers posed by plastics. These bills represent a comprehensive, multifaceted effort to reduce the amount of plastic we use across the economy and they do so by recognizing the responsibility of the companies that produce these plastics to manage their lifecycle rather than solely putting that burden on average consumers.

**S-224** would prohibit the sale, distribution and import of certain products marketed as recyclable unless the NJDEP determines that the product is in fact widely recycled. Currently, misleading application of the symbol for recyclable products leads many consumers to mistakenly place non-recyclable products with products that can actually be recycled, leading to entire batches of recyclable products being disposed in landfills to avoid the costs of separating the products.

**S-226** would limit the size of shipping boxes that can be utilized by major retailers to ship products to consumers by prohibiting the use of a shipping box that is greater than two times the volume of the product being shipped. The current practice of many large online retailers involves the use of shipping boxes that are far larger than the product actually being shipped which unnecessarily increases packaging waste.

**S-3135** would require producers of plastic packaging and certain other plastic products sold in New Jersey to reduce the amount, by weight, of their packaging or products sold annually. The bill would also amend the "Toxic Packaging Reduction Act" to prohibit the sale of packaging that contains certain toxic substances including PFAS, toxic metals and vinyl chloride.
